of Puerto Obaldia and having consented not to do any harm to Panamanians who wish to go to the mountains to extract rubber, gum and vegetable ivory. At 8 p.m. we anchored in the bay of Puerto Obaldia; the following morning President Mendosa landed and went straight to the Police Quarters and the office of Lieutenant Edward Navas, Chief of the detachment of the frontier, who is the supreme authority of that territory. There Dr. Mendosa and his Secretaries of State examined everything and looked at the books. . . . An hour later they went through the streets of the town which now has 32 houses and 100 inhabitants. There is a good school house and they are building a pretty park.

The climate of Puerto Obaldia is healthful. In the mountains there are all kinds of fine lumber, rubber and vegetable ivory, not to mention the coconut plantations, which belong to the Indian tribes. On Sunday at 10 a. m. we left to come back, making stops at several Indian villages. Three hours after we arrived at Sasardi, seat of one the richest tribes. From far away, we saw a Columbian flag at the top of the highest house of the village.

The steamer anchored at about 400 meters from the town and Breakent Mendosa decided to send ashore a commission composed of Mr. J. E. Lefevre, Secretary of Fomento; Dr. Rafael Neira-A., Governor of the Province of Colon; Mr. Antonio Valencia, Lieutenant of the Police Corps, and Mr. Narciso Navas, Interpreter. This commission went ashore to propose to the Indians to send representatives to have a conference with the President and his Secretaries. As soon as the party arrived at Sasardi, some 30 or 40 Indians came shouting toward them, but an equal number of Indians opposed the movement and one of the chiefs demanded respect and calm.

The Indians from Sasardi refused to send their representatives to talk with the President, excusing themselves saying that Inapaquis, their first chief, and the two other prominent chiefs, were at Bogota and that they had no authority to do anything in their absence.

In view of their reasons, we decided to leave at once and proceeded to Cangrejo Island, which we reached at 8 a. m. the following morning. At this island we saw several Panamanian flags and some Panamanian boats taking cargoes of cocanuts. A few minutes after anchoring, a commission was sent ashore to invite the Indians to come on board of the steamer. A few moments after the Indian Chief Igualaqué came on board with his secretary and several other Indians. The Indians were cordially receiv-

EUROPEAN CROP OUTLOOK.

YIELD LOW AND QUALITY POOR IN MANY PLACES.

London, Aug. 16.—In Brittany the harvesting of the wheat is progressing favorably; the weather is dry and warm. The yield in the Loire valley is very poor. It is estimated that it will be necessary, in order to meet requirements, to import from 48 to 96 million bushels. In Italy the outturn of the crop is light, but very good; there is a demand for fine quality red wheat. In Spain the crop is improving. In Belgium and Holland the fine weather has raised hopes of improvement. Canada's exportable surplus of wheat is estimated at 40 million less than 1909. In Australia the new crop of wheat is offered rather freely. In Russia the carting and threshing of the wheat crop is progressing rather slowly. In Roumania the threshing returns are satisfactory; the crop has been marketed on a large scale. In Bulgaria the arrivals from the interior are larger. The wheat crop in Serbia is estimated 25 per cent. under 1908; the yield, however, is heavy. In Hungary there are complaints of the quality of the new crop. In Austria the yield is satisfactory, with the exception of Bohemia.

President Mendosa said he regretted not being able to accept the invitation, on account of not having time enough to go there. Near Cangrejo Island there was another tribe of Indians who have not recognized the Panamanian authorities, and who refused to send their representatives to talk with the President.

At Cangrejo Island we met a bright Indian called Charles, who as a sailor has been to the States and other foreign countries. Charles speaks good English and he offered himself to go on the "Empire" as pilot to take us to other villages. He took the management of the steamer and we proceeded up the Gulf of San Blas, admiring here and there the innumerable islands covered with cocanut palms and meeting sailing boats, which go there to trade with the Indians.
